"The people that walked in darkness have seen a great light: they that dwell in the land of the shadow of death, upon them hath the light shined." Isaiah 9:2



t was 10:30 p.m. and I was heading to church for the late Christmas Eve service. As I drove I entered into the darkness

of that Christmas Eve night guided by the streetlights and the Christmas lights illuminating the houses of those who had turned in for the night.

All was still and quiet when I pulled up to the church: not a creature was stirring! The air was crisp, the snow was falling gently, and at that hour, when most of the places in town were in darkness, there was the light shining out of the church windows to welcome those who gathered to celebrate the birth of Christ and the meal Jesus gave us.

As I set up for the service I went to the front of the church to light the Advent Candles. It was a brief time to review the season of Advent we had just come through, with each candle representing the ways God offers light to contrast the darkness of our world giving us Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love. Last, but not least, there was the Christ Candle reminding us that Christ is the light of the world shining in darkness.

The contrast between darkness and light is a theme that runs throughout the season from Advent to Epiphany. In the midst of the world's darkness we proclaim the promise of light. Amid the darkness cast upon those who walk in despair we pray that Hope will shine, amid the horrific acts of violence happening in this world we pray that Peace will dawn, amid the sadness of those who are mourning we pray that Joy's light will burst forth, and amid the shadow of hatred that divides God's people we plead that God's Love will shed light upon us.

Taking the images of darkness and light seriously, the Christian Church in the 4th century began to observe the birth of Christ at the darkest time of the year by selecting December 25th as the Festival day. Although the festival commonly associated with the Winter solstice was pagan in origin, the early Christian church sought to radically transform the festival by reinterpreting the use of light in the pagan observance to proclaim the gospel of Jesus Christ—a light to the world.

Meeting on Christmas Eve when the light of day has been replaced by the darkness of night we are mindful of the darkness in our world that has us cry out for a saviour. In that time of darkness our celebration is filled with the light of Christ and we rejoice: "For God, who commanded the light to shine out of darkness, hath shined in our hearts, to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ" (2 Corinthian 4:6).

May the light of Christ shine upon you this season and always!





These figures are in order for a small **net gain** at this point in the year. The final months of the year have some unique expenses, so we should be able to come out even.

Donations to the Operating Account have picked up in the last two months, so I have been able to pay back the last debenture for the kitchen project—very good news indeed.

Memorial Account

This account has received donations totalling \$200 in this calendar year. The new handrails up to the pulpit stage (\$1,385) and a new digital projector (\$905) have been purchased out of this account. This account is also the repository for "special" benevolent funds, and has spent \$50 of that this year. The net loss on the account for the year to date is \$2,139.

hite Gift Sunday is December 7th this year, with contributions going to support the efforts of the Sackville Christmas Cheer Committee who want to ensure a bright and happy Christmas for needy families in our community. Gift bags are distributed to children from newborn to 12 years of age, and suggestions include:



Newborn to 2: sleepwear, soft washable toys, bath towels and wash cloths, undershirts, bedding, baby articles (soap, shampoo, etc.), socks, receiving blankets.

Children (2 to 6 years): socks, underwear, tights, small stuffed animals, picture books, dolls and accessories, dress-up jewellery, warm winter clothing (mitts, hats), sleepwear, puzzles, playdough, colouring books and crayons, small snow shovels, small cars and trucks, Lego, blocks, games.

Girls (6 to 12 years): tights, gloves, stocking hats, underwear, sleepwear, stuffed toys, stickers and sticker books, colouring books and crayons, markers, books, puzzles, jewellery, craft kits, games, make-up kits, hair accessories, Barbie dolls and accessories, sweatshirts, fast food coupons, fleece throws, movie passes, crazy carpets.

Boys (6 to 12 years): socks, underwear, sleepwear, baseball caps, games, books, sweatshirts, movie passes, fast food coupons, hockey cards, crazy carpets, fleece throws, warm winter clothing, waterproof gloves.

Gifts should be unwrapped, but donations of wrapping paper are welcome. Please note: CDs, DVDs, videos and video games are not recommended as families may not have the equipment necessary to play them. They also may have limited living space. Please include batteries for any items requiring them.

St. James' Presbyterian Church, Port Elgin



n Sunday, October 5th, the congregation of St. James' Presbyterian Church, Port Elgin, held its final service, which included five baptisms and a celebration of Holy Communion. Rev. Murray and a few members of St. Andrew's were among the many who at-

tended. During the Presbytery Meeting of November 26th the court moved to dissolve the congregation.

The closure of this congregation effectively terminates one of our debts, which was to pay for Port Elgin's portion of the manse on West Avenue, which was jointly owned from 1967 to 2002. This year's payment was made prior to the congregation's official closure date, yet the session of St. James' kindly returned the cheque. We are grateful for this generous act.

Although our relationship with St. James' since 2002 has been more or less the negotiation of buying their portion of the manse and paying this debt, St. Andrew's connection with St. James' began formally in 1939 when the two congregations became part of a three-point charge with St. James' Dorchester, which closed in 1968. Although the congregations were officially linked in 1939 they have a connection that dates to the early to mid-1800s when Dr. Alexander Clarke established congregations in Little Shemogue, Goose River and in Amherst along with a number of "preaching stations"—Port Elgin and Sackville being among them.

When the congregations came together in 1939, Port Elgin was one of the stronger points within the charge and the manse was located there. However, in the 1960s the population of Port Elgin declined and during the ministry of the Rev. Dr. Arthur Van Seters (1965-1968), the difficult decision was made to move the manse from Port Elgin to Sackville.

In 1967 the congregation commissioned Mr. Ralph Dykeman to build the manse and it was completed later that year. As the population in Port Elgin and consequently the support for the congregation continued to decline, the Presbytery of Saint John severed the link between St. Andrew's and St. James' in 2002.

Despite the challenges mentioned above the determined congregation of St. James' strove hard to continue its witness in Port Elgin even in the years leading up to its closure. It should be noted that the congregation made history in 1970 when the congregation elected Mrs. Eleanor Goodwin to the office of ruling elder. Mrs. Goodwin was the first woman to be ordained an elder of the Presbyterian Church in New Brunswick.

In recent years the congregation's witness was lived out in a number of ways. Most notably, the people of St. James' sought to continually anchor themselves in the word of God through Sunday worship and in an ecumenical Bible Study. Also, in keeping with the church's namesake, they demonstrated what it means to be "doers of the word, and not merely hearers" as they developed a relationship with the Westmorland Institution and once a month the inmates and the Chaplain participated in worship services at St. James'.

At this time of dissolution of the St. James' congregation, we celebrate their witness and offer our prayers for the members and adherents as they transition toward a new church home remembering the words of our Saviour: "I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live..."

I truly believe that if we keep telling the Christmas story, singing the Christmas songs, and living the Christmas spirit, we can bring joy and happiness and peace to this world."

I would be delighted to drop off some wool, stuffing and a pattern, or material for the bags. All of these necessities have either been donated or money has been donated in order to replenish them.
