110 Years of Faithful Witness

ast year we celebrated our 70th anniversary of when the congregation undertook a major renovation of the building, which included turning the church 90 degrees. This year we mark our 110th anniversary of offering Presbyterian witness here on the corner of Bridge and Squire streets. It was on this corner that Presbyterians erected a two-story building as a place of worship and fellowship. The building, in its original form, was dedicated 19 November 1905.

The dedication of the building in this location offers us a specific date on which to mark our anniversary. What is more difficult to track down is a specific date for when Presbyterians gathered in Sackville (well, middle Sackville) to form a community of faith, but it was in or before 1843.

While our anniversary celebration rests on a date tied to the building we also celebrate the people who have offered faithful witness in this place. As Living Faith reminds us: "The church is Christ together with his people called both to worship and to serve him in all of life" (7.1.1).

In a time when churches are closing or being torn down it has become popular to emphasize that the church is not a building but a people. This is certainly true and a fitting declaration when a building becomes an albatross around the necks of the people maintaining it, or when the building becomes an idol and a hindrance to the mission of God's people. When people become slaves to a building there is a problem.

There have been many times when I have stressed the importance of the church being a people and not a building, but I must admit that we are fortunate that, for the time being, our place of worship serves us in our continued witness and we are not slaves to it. In fact, as one looks over the history of our modest size church the people have rebuilt, turned, transformed, added and improved this place of worship to serve the people in offering a distinctive witness in each generation.

Yes, the church is not a building! Yet from this church house of ours we are able to be the church for the community of Sackville on the corner of Bridge and Squire. From this home of ours we have worshipped God, we have nurtured our young and old in the faith, and we have celebrated the Sacraments that mark our union with Christ and one another. This house serves as a place to pool our resources to support good works and mission in our community, our nation and our world. This house of worship has provided sanctuary for the lost, discouraged, grieving and those going through difficult times, as we have been able to reach out to one another and offer support in this place. So while the church is not a building, this place is not a hindrance as it has been and remains a rather important element in our life and mission.

In the gospels we have the story of when the disciples were upset when a woman used a pricey alabaster jar of oil to anoint Jesus (worship) instead of selling the oil to give the money to the poor (mission).

We are blessed that one of the above is not sacrificed or scrapped in order to maintain another and we are blessed by the sacrificial giving of talents and treasures so we can support all three. We worship, we work and we give to mission work, and we maintain our home in which we get do all three.

This November we will celebrate the people who secured this lot on the corner of Bridge and Squire 110 years ago and offered future generations a sanctuary, a place to call home and a place from which we would continue to offer witness.

Anniversary Guest Preacher

e will be celebrating our 110th Anniversary on November 15th, marking the time when the original church building on the corner of Bridge and Squire was dedicated for the work of ministry. The Rev. Dr. Cameron Brett will celebrate with us as our guest preacher. Before retiring from fulltime ministry Cameron was the senior minister of St. Andrew's church in downtown Toronto. While serving in Toronto he championed the cause of the homeless and made St. Andrew's a training center for other churches wanting to help homeless people in their communities. His work with the Out the Cold program was recognized by CBC Television's National Magazine, which featured the program in a 1998 documentary. That same year Knox College at the University of Toronto awarded him an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree. During the 1980s Cameron was the minister of Saint Andrew's Church, Fredericton. Today Cam-

eron and his wife Margaret live in Cape Breton along the Bras d'Or Lakes.

What looks like a net gain for the year includes money in the Memorial Account which is extra to the running of the church (\$5,075 earmarked for "elevator", and \$700 in a "benevolent fund"). See below:

You can see that the Operating Account is skin tight: an \$89 net gain, but with only 62% of the budget spent. And the B & R account has gone over budget (127%) because of the unexpected roof repairs needed in winter and spring. The "net gain" in B & R will easily be used up by the higher expenses in the last two quarters of the year (at this writing, the 3rd quarter is yet to be closed, and end of quarter "extra" expenses will be about \$3,500 for 3rd, and about \$6,000 for 4th). "Extra" expenses include budgeted expenses (Presbyterian Sharing, Medical and Dental Insurance, donations to Camp Geddie, Open Sky, etc.) and non-budgeted items (PWS&D, AMS, Food Bank), which are paid quarterly.

Memorial Account

This account balance is about \$9,000, of which \$700 is reserved for "Benevolent Fund", and \$5,075 is earmarked for a potential elevator project. These moneys are held in trust for Session-sanctioned use.

The PAR Program at St. Andrew's — Addendum to Treasurer's Report

he PAR (Pre-Authorized Remittance) program was started at St. Andrew's many years ago, and has helped greatly in maintaining the church's ability to pay its ongoing bills. PAR participants authorize an amount, equal to what they would donate in roughly four weeks, to be taken automatically once a month from their bank account. This transfer occurs on the 20th of each month. Once signed up for the program, the amount you authorize can easily be changed up, down, or cancelled simply by notifying me.

Camp Geddie

or five days in August I served as the Chaplain at Camp Geddie located outside Merigomish, NS. This was my second year serving in this role. Now while our stay at the camp was lovely, with opportunities for swimming, canoeing and playing dodge ball, the chaplain does have daily responsibilities besides being a "presence."

Each day begins at the flagpole overlooking the Northumberland Strait. As our national flag is raised we sing 'O Canada' then the chaplain leads in prayer, shares a bible reading and presents a question for the campers to meditate on. After meeting with the staff there is bible study with the campers and while the counsellors lead the study the chaplain is present as a resource. In the afternoon the chaplain leads a bible study with the staff, and after supper as the sun sets (and sometimes in the complete dark) we meet at the flagpole to bring the flag down, sing "peace be still" and the chaplain offers a closing prayer for the day.

Aside from the various activities that one gets to enjoy at the camp it was a delight to be among the youth and staff during worship, the bible studies and quiet times as it was a chance to connect and hear their take on biblical stories and the faith.

Camp Geddie is a Synod Camp, which began in the mid-1940s. This camp came into being because the Synod believed that camping was an effective way of doing Christian education. It continues to do so today offering Christian witness to young people from different denominations and even some with no church affiliation.
