Samuel Murray and the Presbyterians in Sackville

s we celebrate our anniversary in the Fall, I often like to share a piece of St. Andrew's history in *The Salt*. For this year I thought I would share the story of Samuel Murray and his connection with the Presbyterians in Sackville. Now, given that my son's name is Samuel Murray I should clarify that the Samuel Murray of this story lived from 1857 to 1945.

It was in the 1870s that several branches of Presbyterianism that came over from Scotland united to form The Presbyterian Church in Canada. Since the church in Sackville was part of the Covenanter tradition it was more or less outside of this new movement toward union, although there was some pressure on the Covenanter churches to join in.

Concerning the church in Sackville, "Rev. Joseph Hogg, a Moncton Presbyterian, wrote in 1881: 'After a little care is bestowed on Sackville, they might form together [with others] and join the Presbyterian church." This is where Samuel Crothers Murray comes in, as he was the one to offer the care that Hogg had in mind.

When Samuel resolved to become a minister he attended Mount Allison to pursue a Bachelor of Arts degree, graduating in 1881. After graduation he went to Princeton Theology to prepare for ministry in the Presbyterian Church. While at Princeton, Murray wrote: "In the spring of '84 I applied for a mission field in Saint John Presbytery and was selected for Dorchester and Rockland, only forty miles from home."

In Murray's account of his time in Dorchester he wrote: "Before I left [Dorchester] I visited the Presbyterians of Sackville, a small group that still adhered to the Reformed Presbyterian Church (Covenanters). I induced them to cast in their lot with the Canadian Church [The Presbyterian Church in Canada]. I preached three Sundays and from that time forward, the Sackville Presbyterians were associated with the Presbyterian Church."

I was delighted to receive the story of S. C. Murray this past spring from Dr. Eldon Hay as it does shed some new light on that part of our history. Our current accounts of this period suggest that we joined The Presbyterian Church in Canada during the union of 1875, but from Murray's account it may have been nine years after the union that the Covenanters in Sackville joined the Presbyterian Church.

So along with the many anniversary dates that this year marks for us, from the gathering of the congregation in Middle Sackville to erecting a building on the corner of Bridge and Squire, we can add celebrating 132 years of our union with The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

Anniversary Sunday Guest Preacher

t. Andrew's will be holding its Anniversary Sunday service on Sunday, October 23rd. This year our guest preacher will be the Rev. Iona MacLean. Iona grew up in Halifax NS, the daughter of the Rev. Randolph and Ruth MacLean. She is a graduate of Dalhousie University, Knox College (Toronto), and the Royal Conservatory of Toronto. Iona was the first woman in the Synod of the Atlantic Provinces to be ordained to the ministry of Word and Sacraments, and since her ordination in 1977 she has served charges in Ontario and Nova Scotia. She retired in November 2015 after almost 24 years as minister of First Presbyterian Church, Pictou.

Rev. MacLean has served the wider church on various committees, including convener of the International Affairs Committee of General Assembly, and is a past moderator of The Synod of the Atlantic Provinces. She was married to the late Rev. Glenn Cooper, former Clerk of the Synod. Iona lives again in Halifax and continues ministry through pulpit supply and committee work in Synod and General Assembly.

The Elevator Project

n Sunday, September 18th, St. Andrew's marked the completion of the Elevator Project with a service of dedication. The occasion marked the fruition of many discussions, meetings, and walks around the church. To assist the congregation in its discernment of this project a graphic of the projected structure was posted alongside a paper version of the elevator to give us a sense of the space the new structure would occupy. It was at the February 2016 Annual Meeting that the congregation came to the unanimous decision to proceed with installing a Vertical Platform Lift. After the congregational meeting pledges were made and significant donations and debentures started to come in.

To seek funding assistance for the project we applied for a grant from the McBain-Barker fund through Canadian Ministries of the Life and Mission Agency. The purpose of this fund is to support small communities, such as St. Andrew's, Sackville. As a result of our application the elevator project was supported in part by a bequest to The Presbyterian Church in Canada. The Presbytery of New Brunswick supported our grant application to Canadian Ministries and they also generously offered a grant to support the project. These gifts from the National church and the Presbytery certainly helped us out, yet the success of this project depended greatly on the sacrificial giving of the people in this small congregation. At the dedication we celebrated the success of our efforts and we gave thanks to God from whom all blessings flow.

During the dedication service Pauline Atkinson took part in the celebration by presenting the elevator on behalf of the congregation requesting that it be dedicated to the glory of God.

Board of Managers Update

he 2016 year has involved several projects undertaken for the maintenance and enhancement of the Church's buildings and grounds:

- Roofing repairs were conducted on several occasions as a result of wind damage
- A storage shed was purchased to house lawn mowing and gardening equipment
- Outdoor water spigots were installed in the front and the rear of the Church

Thanks to donations and debentures from the congregation and friends of the Church, grants from the Presbytery of New Brunswick and the McBain-Barker fund (Presbyterian Church in Canada), the Elevator Project was culminated with a dedication on September 18th. This project included installation of the elevator, painting of the Narthex and portions of the basement Church hall, and installation of an additional hand rail leading from the Narthex to the basement.

The Board wishes to thank all those who have contributed to lawn mowing during the summer months, and to those who assisted Michael Capper's efforts with the garden.

Becoming a Member of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church

oday when we think of membership it often corresponds with having certain benefits, discounts or services. We have our shopping memberships, our gym memberships, etc. However, membership in a church is different as it expresses our commitment to serving God through the church and with that comes the ability to exercise certain rights and privileges within The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

Why should I become a member?

The Bible reveals to us that our God is a covenant-making God. Membership is a way of expressing our commitment to God and to the church, the people of God. When we become members we confess faith in God and commit ourselves to a covenant with God and, at the same time, with each other.

What's the difference between being a member or an adherent of a congregation?

They are very similar and adherents are often as dedicated to the ministry of the congregation as members, sometimes even more so. However, members promise to live in a covenantal community with God and one another. There are also times in the life of the congregation when it does make a difference. When parents wish to have their child baptized at least one parent should be a member of the church. Only a member can be ordained an elder or vote for an elder. Only members can sign a call for a minister (although adherents do have the opportunity to sign a concurrence to a call).

How can I become a member?

There are three ways to become a member: by Profession of Faith, Certificate of Transfer from another Church in which one was a member, or by Resolution of Session if a certificate of transfer is not possible.

The above information is very brief and may lead to more questions than answers. If you have any questions about the Presbyterian Church or about membership, Jeff will be happy to discuss these matters with you.

The compost heap is happy to continue to receive contributions at any time you are so moved.
