For our Anniversary Service on Sunday 31 October, Rev. Wendy MacWilliams will be celebrating with us as our guest preacher.

Wendy serves as Minister of Word and Sacrament within a regional ministry consisting of St. James, Hanwell and St. Paul's, Woodstock. This year she is also serving as the Moderator for the Presbytery of New Brunswick.

Although originally from Prince Edward Island, Wendy called Greater Moncton home for most of her life. Prior to ministry, she worked in community and economic development for over a decade, working in not-for-profit business support organizations and the Atlantic Canada Opportunities Agency.

Atlantic Mission Society

We started our first fall meeting at Open Sky in September, a place we all enjoy visiting. We were told about some of the differences made mentioned by the new executive director Laura Hunter, who, after the meeting gave us a tour to see the two new donkeys and new goats! We also saw the size of their garden. Amazing! Of course we also had the opportunity to buy fresh vegetables, pickles, jams and jellies. On one of the jars of pickles I bought was listed the ingredients, and finished with "made with love".

The meeting was a bit more somber, as that same day our associative member and very dear friend Edward Allen had the rest of his ashes scattered by Terrlynn and her family. A memorial prayer was said.

We donated \$200.00 to Open Sky, as this year they have seventeen students attending their programme.

We also donated \$100.00 to the Dorchester milk programme, as a few of our Sackville students attend there.

During our meeting in October we voted on sending \$150.00 to the Indigenous ministry through PWS&D. We also distributed coloured piggy banks to each member. At the end of the year they will be turned in, emptied and then given back. They have a removable snout! The money will be divided in half: one half going to the food bank and the second half going to the breakfast programme at Tantramar high school.

Next month on November 13th we will be having at our meeting an in-gathering service. Everyone is invited.

And just think! This is only October!

The nice net gain is due largely to under spending of the budget due to the pandemic.

The B & R account is nicely bolstered here by a surprise donation from an estate! The \$9967 is our regular donations, and they are right on target.

At $\frac{3}{4}$ (75%) of the year, we have raised only 72% of Operating Account budget, but a full 150% of the B & R regular budget. Operating is "in the black" because only 66% of its budget has been spent!

Memorial Account

The Memorial Account has a balance of about \$12,000, of which \$1,680 is, at present, the amount reserved for the Benevolent Fund. The rest of the funds in the account are held in trust for Session-sanctioned use.
